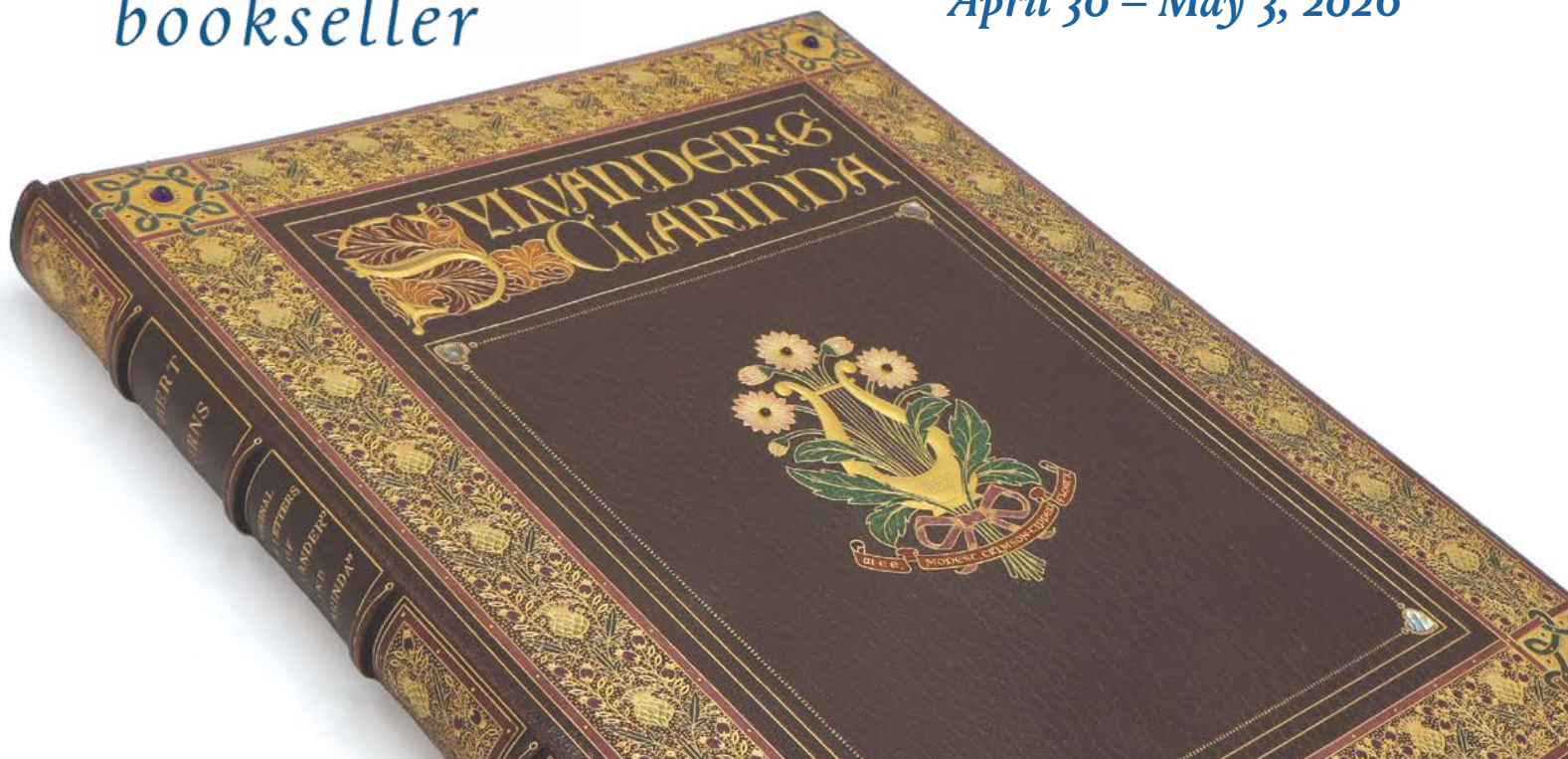

Other highlights include a signed copy of the first great chronicle of the New World, *La Historia General de las Indias*, and the Hoe copy of Dürer's masterpiece on human proportion, aesthetics, and anthropometry.

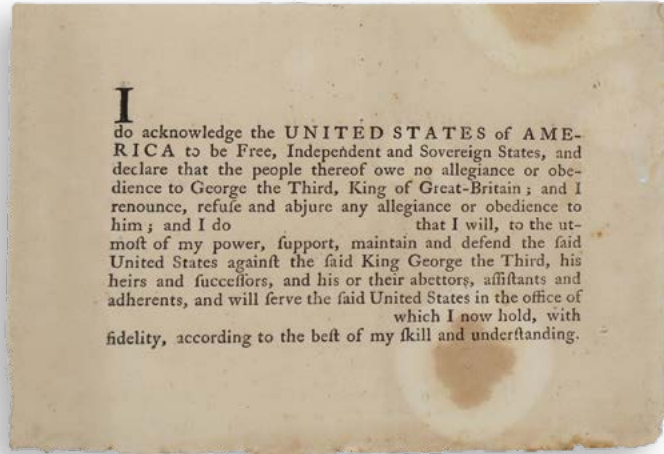

Sir,

I have the honour of enclosing copies of papers received at this department complaining that Augustus P. Chouteau, Julius Demun and several other persons, Citizens of the United States, were in the month of May last seized within the undoubted limits of the United States, by a military force, under the orders of the Spanish Government in alliance together with property belonging to them to a large amount; that they were carried to Santa Fe, and there detained with much inconvenience, nearly fifty days when they were discharged; but that the property taken from them was not restored.

For this outrage upon the persons and property of Citizens of the United States, I am directed by the President to demand from your Government, the satisfaction justly due. The Documents at this Department, will substantiate an actual loss of property of more than thirty thousand Dollars. For this as well as for the other damages sustained by these individuals in consequence of the transactions detailed in the enclosed papers, it is presumed that your government will readily assent to the measure necessary for making suitable restitution and indemnification.

I pray you to accept the assurance of my distinguished
Consideration,

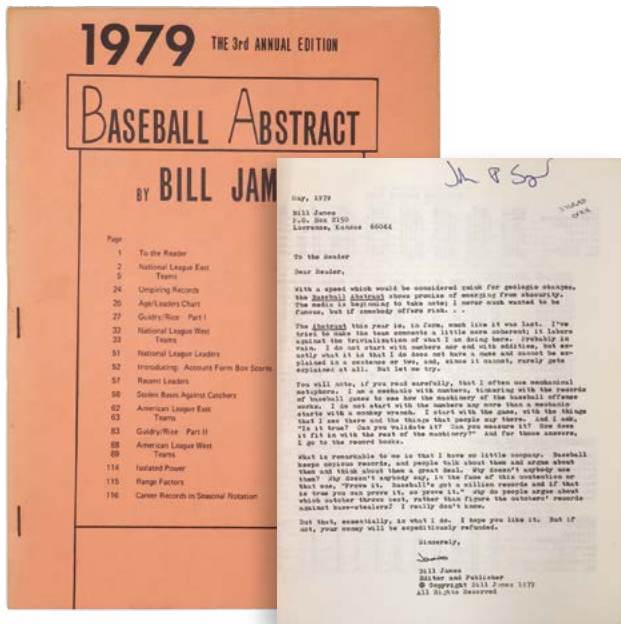

EXECUTION OF CAPT. JOHN BROWN.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the American Anti-Slavery Society, held in Boston, November 1st, the following Resolution was adopted:—

Resolved, That it is recommended to the friends of impartial freedom throughout the Free States, in case of the execution of Capt. JOHN BROWN, now on trial for his life, in Virginia, to observe that tragical event, ON THE DAY OF ITS OCCURRENCE, in such manner as by them may be deemed most appropriate in their various localities,—whether by public meetings and addresses, the adoption of resolutions, private conferences, or any other judicious mode of action,—for the furtherance of the Anti-Slavery cause, and resolutely to consecrate themselves to the patriotic and Christian work of effecting the abolition of that most dangerous, unchristian, cruel, and impious system of Slavery, which is the fruitful source of all our national heart-burnings and conflicts, which powerfully and increasingly tends to promote war, insurrections and civil war, which cannot be more truly or more comprehensively described than as "THE SIN OF ALL VILLAGES," which is a burning disgrace and fearful curse to the whole country, and by the speedy extinction of which, alone, can the land be saved from violence, blood, and other demoralization.

No suggestion more timely and important than this could be made; and now that Sentence of Death has been pronounced against the brave martyr to his principles, let the day of his execution — FRIDAY, December 24, — be the occasion of such a public moral demonstration against the bloody and merciless Slave system as the land has never witnessed. Friends of Freedom everywhere! begin at once to make the necessary arrangements. The appeal is made to you all, without regard to sect or party, or different shades of opinion. Let it be a memorable day in the history of the United States. In all the Cities and Towns of the North, let there be some visible and expressive form of manifestation. Among other things, let there be a selling of the bells for one hour.

As a postponement of the execution may take place, on account of the application by Mr. BROWN'S Counsel to the Virginia Court of Appeals, it may be necessary to hold the commemoration on another day. Friends! be vigilant!

And it is further suggested that, at all these meetings, resolutions should be taken up in behalf of the Widow and Family of Capt. JOHN BROWN.

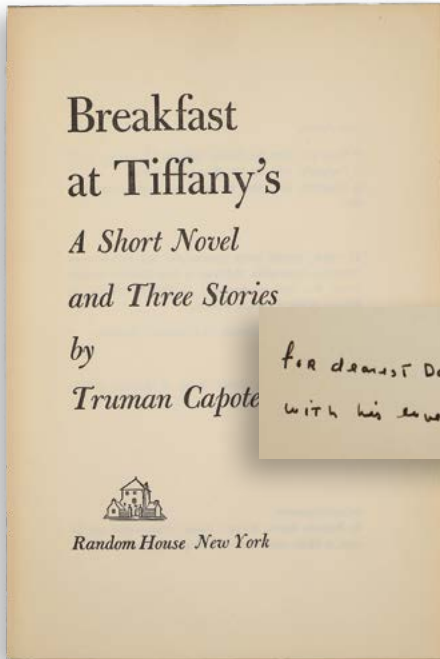

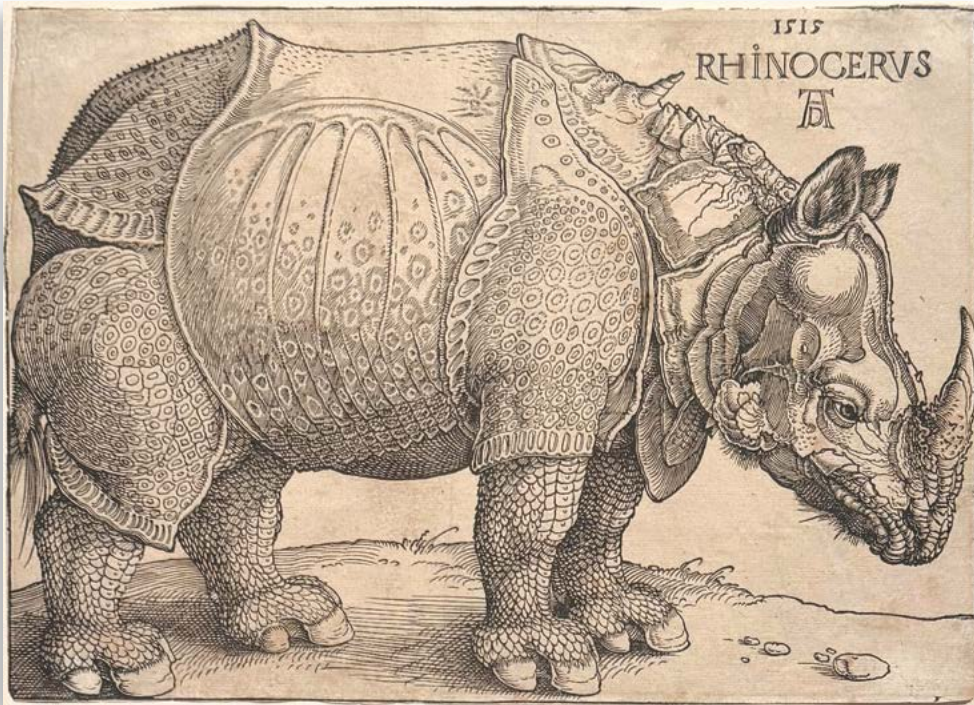

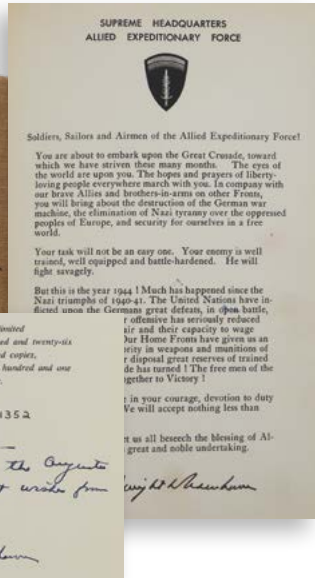
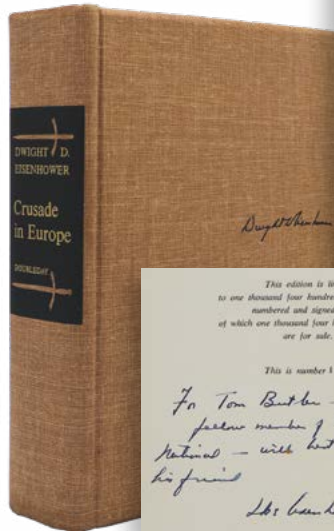
We are convinced that Schools ought to be established, but we are fully persuaded, that their establishment should be conducted and regulated in such a manner, that they may not become an Injury, Nuisance or Detriment, to those good citizens of this State, who as members of certain religious societies, conscientiously think it their duty, not only to confer useful knowledge upon their children, but also to instruct them in the religious principles peculiar to themselves, and standing high in their Estimation; which especially is the case of us your Petitioners, who from considerations of this nature have already been at vast expence to erect Schools of their own, many of which are at present in a flourishing condition.

Should your Honorable House institute Schools, according to the design expressed in the bills above mentioned, then we humbly pray, that our Schools, which are already erected or may hereafter be erected, in and by any of the Congregations of our profession in this State, may be endowed with a full share and portion, of the monies to be raised by a Tax, and of the funds to be appropriated to any of the Schools contemplated by the said bills, and with this provision that such our Schools shall remain, under the sole inspection and direction of persons appointed by our respective Congregations, for that purpose.

As the object of our petition is proper and just and founded on the principles of religious Liberty guaranteed by the Constitution of this State, we have every right and reason to expect, that our request will be granted: And we shall ever pray.

Dear Mr. Hood:

This letter will be presented to you by my friend and assistant Mr. Arthur Blendorff to whom I have given all the necessary instructions for supervising the work of preparing the walls for the fresco which I am to execute in Rockefeller Center.

I have seen the last blue prints relative to the preparation of the wall and I am completely in accord with the new plans in the form that you propose them.

I have also asked my friend Mr. Blendorff to speak of the location of the workers to be employed. In order to avoid all difficulties Mr. Blendorff will have sole charge of the constant supervision of the work to be executed by the plasterers and other workers who are regular members of the corresponding unions, also, for greater certainty, these workers present there should be a plasterer with Rockefeller Center, for the execution of the fresco there should be a plasterer who would have as his assistant a horse painter who is acquainted, if possible, with fresco.

So^l. 10. The members of each House shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained and paid by the State, in which they shall be chosen.

So^l. 11. The creating title of the laws of the United States shall be, "Be it enacted, and it is hereby enacted by the House of Representatives, and by the Senate of the United States, in Congress assembled."

So^l. 12. Each House shall possess the right of originating bills, except in the cases beforementioned.

So^l. 13. Every bill, which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a law, be presented to the President of the United States, for his review: If, upon such review, he approve of it, he shall signify his approbation by signing it: But if, upon such review, it shall appear to him improper for being passed into a law, he shall return it, together with his objections against it, to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider the bill. But if, after such reconsideration, two thirds of that House shall, notwithstanding the objections, be sent to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two thirds of the other House also, it shall become a law. But, in all such cases, the yeas of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays; and the names of the persons voting for or against the bill shall be entered in the Journal of each House respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the President within seven days after it shall have been presented to him, it shall be a law, unless the Legislature, by their adjournment, prevent its return; in which case it shall not be a law.

So^l. 1. The Legislature of the United States shall have the power to lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises;

To establish an uniform rule of naturalization throughout the United States;

To coin money;

To regulate the value of foreign coins;

To fix the Standard of weights and measures;

To establish post-offices;

To borrow money, and emit bills on the credit of the United States;

To appoint a Treasurer by ballot;

To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

To make rules concerning captures on land and water;

To declare the law and punishment of piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and the punishment of counterfeiting the coin of the United States, and of officers against the law of nations;

To subdue a rebellion in any State, on the application of its Legislature;

To make war;

To raise armies;

To build and equip fleets;

To call forth the aid of the militia, in order to execute the laws of the Union, enforce treaties, suppress insurrections, and repel invasions;

And to make all laws that shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested, by this Constitution, in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

So^l. 2. Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against the United States, or in adhering to the enemies of the United States, or in giving them aid and comfort. The Legislature of the United States shall have power to declare the punishment of treason. No person shall be convicted

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
